On a recent Saturday two members of the Historic Route 395 Association spent several hours at the Museum looking through our files for photos and information on old Highway 395. Needless to say they found many photos and information on this subject from photos of the stagecoach on the Scripps Ranch Route to more recent times.

In June 2008, Route 395 was designated a historic highway and signage has been installed in several locations. You may have noticed some of these signs along the freeway. The ultimate plan of this group is to have signage from San Diego to the Cajon Pass.

They are also planning their first highway event in Fallbrook on June 25,2011. So remember watch for the signs, whether you are driving north or south, slowdown and enjoy Historic Route 395.

GRANNY'S ATTIC

May 21st, 9:00 AM - 2:00 PM

Vintage items will be on sale. The Poway Historical Society found treasures in their attic. Many are duplicates but some are one of a kind.

Found items include a 1910-1930 electric coffee pot that will appeal to Arts & Crafts people. Members have researched a Thermador foot heater, circa 1910. Also found were three typewriters, one is a Calligrapher and some Haviland bone china dishes.

TRAVELING IN POWAY

Statistics show us that in 1900, most people never traveled more than a total of 1,200 miles during their entire lives. This is because they did most of that traveling on foot or on horseback. This transportation limited how much of a farmer's crop could be carried into town. In Poway, the farmer spent 8 hours by wagon taking their produce to San Diego.

The bicycle and automobile made their appearance, as evidenced by the following articles in the Poway Progress in 1895: Will Bowron arrived by wheel from Pasadena—Fred Gilbert and Frank Collier of San Diego came out by wheel last Saturday. - Ed Warren, L. E. Kent, and Perley Kent can now be seen whizzing through our valley on a bike."

1921 was the dedication of the first paved road, Poway Road to Escondido. An annual two-dollar county tax was required of every adult male citizen to provide the money for such work. This was called a poll tax.*

HISTORICAL SOCIETY BOARD MEMBERS VISIT SIKES HOUSE




Poway Historical Society Board members Brian Bazzeni, Cecilia Burr, Carol Crafts, Jan Rubacky and Jean Woodruff visited Sikes Adobe Farmhouse on February 2nd. They were welcomed by Anne Cooper, museum manager and given a brief outline of future events at Sikes. Since Anne had a prior commitment she turned the group over to Cecilia Burr, a long time volunteer at Sikes.

The farm house which dates back to 1870 was completely destroyed during the Witch Creek fire. It has been rebuilt and refurnished. Fortunately the San Dieguito River Park Association had access to the original building plans and proceeded from there. The Colonial

Dames helped with the furnishings.

The farm was the home of Zenas and Eliza Sikes,who arrived in 1870 along with their six children from Santa Clara County. The main crop was winter wheat which had a good market in Europe at the time. Unfortunately Zenas Sikes succumbed to gangrene after being kicked by a horse in his leg.

Medical care was limited at the time and Zenas died leaving Eliza with a life insurance policy, which was rare at the time. Eliza lost the farm as she had spent her life insurance inheritance on furnishings for the house. She was unable to repay the loans on the property and was

There are costumes of duster coats and a suit worn by the Porters in the 1900's when driving was unusual. One woman's duster is white linen with embroidered buttons. The suit is a taupe color with tiny darts embroidered on the jacket and pleats of the skirt. Below the model is a photograph of it worn by Mrs. Porter.

There's a model of a stagecoach and buggy that were the means of travel to Escondido and San Diego. There are more photographs of the early school bus and others scattered around the museum. It shows how Poway advanced rapidly through the years with the development of transportation 100 years ago.
